You can click on any word in the **collocates list** or any highlighted word in the **concordance lines** to see all entries in the corpus. By default, it shows you that word as a collocate. For example, if you are already looking at the entry for **moonlight**, then you can click on **pale**, **window**, or **reflect** to see them as collocates. By clicking on QUERY THAT WORD, you can switch to see the full entry for that word; for example **reflect**.

After about 20 queries, we ask that you register for continued use of the corpus. This is a one-time process that takes just a minute or two.
