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Target Students: Lower intermediate

Class Duration: 120 minutes

Lesson Objectives: By the end of the lessons, the students will be able to:

1. identify the correct *wh*-words, word order and verb phrase structure in *wh*-questions;
2. ask *wh*-questions in a role play on pet adoption.

Procedures

Part A Video Watching

Who	person (subject / object)	Who is that man? That's my uncle. Who has saved you? Who did you see?
Whom	person (object)	Whom did you see? To whom have you given the chocolates?
What	idea action object	What do you think? What are you doing? What is that?
Where	place	Where is your school?
When	time	When do you go to school? At 7:00.
Why	reason	Why do you sleep late? I've to finish my work.
How	manner	How do you go to school? By bus.
Which	choice	Which dish should we choose?
Whose	possession	Whose is this pen?

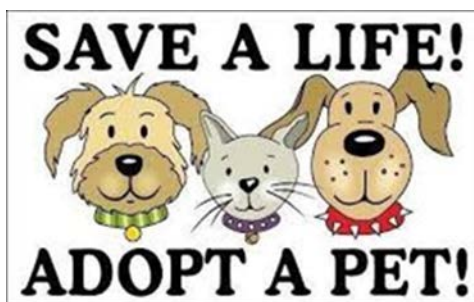
